



Employment

An Assistant In Nursing (AIN) works under the direction of a Registered Nurse (RN) or Enrolled Nurse (EN) by providing patient support services in general patient care settings.

AIN's have strong communication skills and are responsible for relaying patient inquiries to RNs, recording accurate patient records, and assist in the planning of daily routines and ongoing care regimens.

AIN roles are often the starting point for many nurses' careers, allowing them to gain valuable experience in health care before undertaking further study.
